My dear Senator:

Reference is made to your letter of February 12, transmitting papers in the case of Walter Winsborough of the Carlisle Indian School, requesting that the matter be investigated, and the request of the parents that he be returned home complied with if possible.

I have had this matter carefully looked into, and it appears Walter has been suffering from an attack of acute inflammatory rhoumatism. An unfortunate sequelae in this case was a cardiac complication and a rather acute congestion of the lungs. After rest in bed, and proper treatment for sometime, these conditions have greatly improved, and at the present time his condition is quite satisfactory. Of course as you can well imagine he can hardly be considered in other than a delicate state of health, and I really doubt the advisability of sending him to Montana at this time of the year for fear he will have a relapse, which would probably result in his early demise.

I think you will agree with me that it would be better if he remains under supervision and proper

treatment until spring, when he can be returned to his home with less danger. This especially is true in view of the fact that he has done so well at Carlisle so far.
