Noting in your letter of the 4th instant that your coming to Carlisle was delayed because of an extensive quarantine to prevent the spread of scarlet fever and that you are yet anxious to come here, you must now be advised that a recent decision by the Indian Office at Washington regarding other students who have enjoyed advantages similar to those reported by you when you applied for enrolment makes it imperative that you be refused entrance here. Some of the students now enrolled who have access to good schools at their homes must be sent home and unless you care to take the matter into consideration direct with the Commissioner of Indian Affairs there is nothing more that can be done here.
