In reply you are advised that the inclosed formal application blanks should be filled out and submitted to the Superintendent of the Carlisle School, Mr. John Francis, jr. The age, tribe, degree of Indian blood, information as to whether this young men is of the restricted or unrestricted class, and his financial status or that of his parents, should be given in making application for enrollment in a Government Indian School.

If the information furnished in the formal application is satisfactory to the Super-intendent he will notify you whether he can accommodate this young man at the Carlisle Indian School.
