The Office is in receipt of your letter of April 24, 1918, relative to the inclusion of the outing pupils of your school in the average attendance.


The attendance reports in this Office show that the exclusion of the outing pupils went into effect in the report of the third quarter, 1914. The following tabulation giving the averages since that time shows that except in a few cases, they are comparatively the same:

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You may have overlooked the fact that the records of the outing pupils are shown in the quarterly and that they are excluded only from the attendance which makes up the average. In the monthly they are included in item 1, but should not be counted in items 4 and 5, as they are not actually present. For the future, if you wish to make a distinctive record, a space might be marked off between items 3 and 4, giving the number of outing pupils for each day.

Sir:

The receipt is acknowledged of your form letter in which you invite attention to an apparent contradiction between the average attendance at this school, given in the report of the second quarter as 574.8 while that obtained from the monthly reports for the same period is 651.9.

In response your attention is invited to the fact that this apparent discrepency is due to students "on the outing." On the quarterly report, students "on the outing" are excluded in accordance with the foot-note on the bottom of the back page of the report. On the monthly reports, column #5 "Number present", the number of students "on the outing" is included, and the average monthly attendance, as given on the third page of the report, also includes the students "on the outing".

Out Principal, Mr. Blair, advises me that this has been the practice followed at this school. While, in accordance with Office instructions, students "on the outing" were excluded in the quarterly report, it was felt that the outing work should properly be shown in the monthly report to the Office, as otherwise the Office would have no record of this important school activity. In the attendance column the statement was made, under "Remarks", that the pupil was under outing.
