SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mr. Kah-o-sed:

In a letter I received today from the Office at Washington authority is given me to effect the enrolment at Carlisle of your nephew Arney, but a closer examination of the application for his enrolment disclosed the fact that he has not completed the 3rd Grade of academic work that is now required to establish eligibility for enrolment here. I must also state that when the application was submitted to our school physician for his information he submitted a statement as is copied below:

"I must positively recommend that the application of Arney Kah-o-sed be not allowed. According to the doctor's statement this boy has a locomotor ataxia which improved under anti-syphilitic treatment. His condition now is said to be only fairly good. This being true this boy is not fit for the strain which the school routine imposes."

As the boy cannot be allowed to come here unless the examining physician has information that is more assuring than that contained in the application for his enrolment I must ask you to let me hear from you again. Will you also inform me what academic work the boy has done since he returned home from the

pledged citizen of this country
because there is no law to
make ^{him} as such. An Indian
is a very peculiar animal
from the stand point of the
white

people. Second (I had
I would not have signed
the application that I sent
you if I was not legal
guardian of the boy.

Some years ago I had
our nephew who went
to Haskell, Kan. Captain
Mercer went on Indian
Agent there at Leech Lake.
Indian Commissioner &
Sexton quarrel happened there.
I made the application
same as I send you they
at that time saw no reason
why my nephew should
not go to Haskell as long
as I was an Indian

& was being for the Indian in the Court
that I had a right to have my nephew
enrolled in Indian school at Haskell
of course my nephew was enrolled
there.

I am glad to take this opportunity to write
the Indian up in all right. The only grounds
I have for asking my nephew to be
enrolled at Leech Lake is I am an Indian
Priest of the American Church (Episcopal)
& have been, & still working among
the Indians here in Minnesota. The

because I am told that
children are not to go on
until 1st of Oct.

My dear Mr. Kah-o-sed:

I have received your favor of the 15th instant, with which you enclosed the application for the enrolment at Carlisle of your nephew. However, I have noted that the young man was born in Canada and that he does not have rights on the White Earth reservation, so must state that his transfer here cannot be allowed except under an arrangement whereby tuition charges at the rate of \$200.00 per year will be paid. Only these Indian young men and women of a sufficient degree of Indian blood who were born in the United States can be considered eligible for enrolment in the Government's schools.

If the boy's parents were citizens of the United States, or either of them, or if you are a citizen and the legal guardian of the boy, please advise me and I will take the matter up with the Indian Office and see what can be done. The rules are now very strict regarding the enrollment of students in Indian Schools, but I shall be glad to help you out if I can possibly do so.

I regret very much that a more favorable reply than this
