

There is herewith enclosed some correspondence including letters and telegrams with reference to the discharge of an Indian girl named Cora James from Carlisle. I am unable to get any satisfaction as to why she was discharged, except that it was her "personal wish".

I wish you would call upon the Commissioner of Indian Affairs to furnish the information that prompted him to issue an order for the discharge of Cora James from Carlisle.

I might further say that Cora James ia a full-blood Indian girl, fourteen years old, and that she was put on the train on the ll" of June, and did not arrive in Ardmore until the 18th of June, she coming all the way by herself so far as I have been able to learn.

I am inclined to believe that the management at.

Carlisle is not just what it ought to be if this case is to be used as an example. However, I will withhold any further criticism until I know all the facts.

Dear Sir:

I received your telegram as follows:

"Please place by wire transportation Cartisle to Ardmore for Cora James, whose personal wish to return home has been approved by the commission."

to which I replied by wire:

"County Judge and U. S. Probate Attorney disapproved sending transportation for Cora James."

If you will refer to the correspondence between me and Mr. Wyly with reference to the placing of Cora James in Carlisle, you will observe shet had practically finished the course in St. Agnes Academy, and could no longer stay there, and that she had no other place to go, and that if she returned to her natural haunts, getting her to return to school next fall would be highly improbable. It was therefore necessary to put her in some school for the summer rather than permit her to return to some relative, who would take her back to the condition of the original Indians in this country.

Mention was also made of some accomplishments that ought to be developed in her. She has now been in your school about three weeks, and being only 14 years of age, she naturally would get homesick and want to come home. And as you state in your telegram, it is her personal wish to return home. I can hardly understand how it is that you permit the immates of your institution to intertain and cultivate such extravagant ideas.

I have discussed this matter quite at lenth with the County Judge, who supervises me in paying out guardianship money, as well as the U.S. Probate attorney and the Field Clerk, Col. S. A. Mills, all whom are well acquainted with Cora James, and they all agree that it would be the height of folly for her to come back to Oklahoma for such a reason as assigned by you in your telegram.

Since writing the enclosed letter I received another telegram from Mr. Francis, as follows:

Have been ordered to return Cora James and will do so on Monday, as this action is based on her request in all fairness she should pay her own leaving expenses.

I thereupon wired the Honorable Commissioner of Indian affairs as follows:

Cora James fourteen year old Choctaw Indian girl recently enrolled in Carlisle from Oklahoma has been ordered discharged because of her personal wish; I as her guardian have been requested to provide transportation. Can she not be retained in Carlisle unless better reason for her discharge exists.

I am submitting this matter to you because I beleive you understand that possibly a girl only 14 years old placed in school at this time is liable to become "homesick" and want to leave, but that a few days longer in the institution would be sufficient to reconcile her to her new environments, and that a simple personal wish is not sufficient reason for permitting a student to leave the school.

I was pleased to note the magnificent school and management, when I wlaced Cora there some weeks ago, and I would regret for her to be deprived of the training she will received just because she may be "homesick"

I sent you the following telegram:

Cora James, 14 year old Choctaw Indian girl recently entolled in Carlisle from Oklahoma has been ordered discharged "Cora James. because of her personal wish; I as her guardian have been requested to provide transportation. Can she not be retained in Carlisle unless better reason for her

discharge exists.

This was the result of telegrams between me and the Supt. at Carlisle, the first of which was received by me just before noon as follows:

"Please place by wire transportation, Carlisle to Ardmore for Cora James, whose personal wish to return has been approved by the commission."

to which I replied:

"County Judge and U. S. Probate Attorney disapprove sending transportation for Cora James."

to which I received the following letter:

"Have been ordered to return Cora James and will do so on Monday as this action is based on her request in all fairness she should pay her own leaving expenses."

Treceiving this last telegram, I then wired you. It was my object to call your attention, that this girl ought not to be discharged unless a better reason than bersonal wish" exists:

A history of this case is as follows: Cora James is fourteen years old, and I have been her guardian for about seven years. Immediately after I was appointed guardian, I placed here in St. Agnes Academy in Ardmore, Oklahoma, where she remained until the 15th of May last. Then under directions of Mr. A. S. Wyly, Supervisor of Schools, I had her carried to Carlisle. My directions for carrying her to Carlisle was a letter from Mr. Wyley, dated April 12, 1917, as follows:

"This office has a letter from the Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian School, stating that you have forwarded application for the enrollment of Cora James in that School. He also states that the application is satisfactory and if you can send the girl to Carlisle at her own expense he can receive her at any time.".

This girl had practically completed the course at St. Agnes Academy, and as she was an orphaned girl, had no home to go to, except to remain in this school. All of these facts were set out in the correspondence between myself and Mr. Wyly.

It now seems to me that to return this girl to Oklahoma just because she wants to come is not the proper thing to do. Of course, if some reason exists other than her personal wish, than of course, I will submit whatever order should be made in the premises, will a course.
