Dear Sir:-

An Indian boy representing himself as Walter Standing Elk, a former student of Carlisle came into Police Headquarters of this City yesterday afternoon and asked that some one correspond with the Carlisle School or the proper authorities, looking to securing transportation or some aid in his effort to get back to Carlisle. The matter was brought to my attention by the Chief, and as the boy seemed to be bona fide, I thought it not improper for me to take this matter up with your department and see if some provision could be made to take the boy back to Carlisle.

It seems that he ran away from the school, as I understand it, about one year ago, and has been at work on the construction of the Snow Bird Railroad in the Western part of this State. He is now absolutely destitute, and if possible, some provision should be made to get him back to Carlisle. He is now occupying one of the cells and on prisoners rations in accordance with my order, although, you will understand there is no charge against him.
