The Maxime Favel who is referred to in the Office's letter of July the 10th, and whose communication is being attached hereto, has been the subject of other correspondence with the Office this calendar year. Such correspondence is being transmitted herewith.

There is nothing in our records to indicate what Favel has done during the time he has been in York, but it is my opinion that he has been engaged in common laboring. He did not remain at Carlisle long enough to complete a trade and it is to be doubted that he will prove to be much of a success in any eastern city. He must have property at his home on the Colville Reservation and at the time he came to Carlisle he must have had funds from some source. There seems to be no reason why he should not use what funds he has to his credit at the Colville Agency to pay for his return home, because he must have understood when he came to Carlisle that he would have to pay for his transportation home.

Your letter is interesting because it leads the Office to believe that you are really anxious to make a success of yourself and because of this, the Office is anxious to help you. You should understand that it has no intention of depriving you of your money but believes that for the present, you should not return to the reservation. It seems reasonable to suppose that you will find better opportunities where you are than back home on the reservation, and with this in mind, you are urged to make another effort to succeed where you are.

It is gratifying to know that you have made a good reputation for yourself and have become acquainted

with a great number of respectable business men. These two facts alone are worth a very great deal to any young man and their value can hardly be over-estimated. I ask you, therefore, to delay your home going at least for a time until I can look into your case more carefully. I shall write you again at an early date. Meanwhile, do your level best.

Sir:

Maxime Favel, of Waconda, Washington, has been in the Office and says that in the fall of 1911, when he was about twenty years of age, he advanced his transportation from Republic, Washington, to Carlisle, amounting to \$68.75. He understood at the time that he went to Carlisle that the transportation which he advanced would be refunded. He says that during his enrollment he asked that this be done, but no action was taken. He left the school in June, 1913.

Please look into this matter, and if, in your judgment, his transportation to Carlisle should have been paid by the Government, consider the advisability of submitting a claim covering the amount of his transportation. He is at present employed at York, Pa., and you may communicate with him there.

My dear Mr. Lippe:

I am in receipt of a letter dated York, Pennsylvania, March 21, 1914, from one Maxime Favel, a former pupil of the Carlisle School, who complains that he came to said school from the Colville Reservation, Washington, and enrolled during the fall of 1911; that he paid the sum of \$68.75 for his transportation from his home to said Carlisle School, which should have been paid by the Government, and that it was his understanding from Captain Webster, his Agent, that this transportation would be paid for him by the Government.

He has never received the return of his \$68.75. It is probable that this amount may have been vouchered to the Government.

I wish you would look this matter up at once and advise me promptly in the premises.

Sir:

Referring to the Office's letter of March the 24th, I respectfully report that there is no evidence on file here to show that Maxime Favel's transportation from his home to Carlisle was paid by the Government.

The records here indicate that Maxime was enrolled for but one year and that he went to his home after he had remained here for a week or two longer than that year. Later he again returned to Carlisle, and within a few months after that he deserted to York, Pennsylvania, where he escaped detection by posing as a Negro. When he was apprehended and returned here to school he remained only from September the 20th of 1913 to October the 20th of the same year.
