I transmit herewith Court-Martial Proceedings in the case of Grover Allen, and in case of John Plenty and John

Grover Allen was found guilty of going to the town of Carlisle without permission and in civilian clothes, and of associating with a woman of immoral character. He was tried by Court-Martial convened by my order and composed of the Officers of the squadron.

John Plenty and John Martin, students of the Carlisle School, entered the girls' quarters last night and entered girls' rooms for immoral purposes. They were court-martialed by my order and the sentence appears on the enclosed copy of the proceedings.

These cases simply establish the truth of the statements that have been made regarding immoral conditions at this
school. I believe the large majority of the students in this
school are moral and trustworthy. There are several, however,
of the other kind, and it is very important that drastic action
be taken in these cases and at once. John Plenty and John

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Martin are both young men and are members of the track team.

Grover Allen is also a young man and has been guilty of like offenses before. I do not know whether there is a State Reformatory School in Pennsylvania to which these boys could be sent or not. I will make inquiry about this matter and ascertain whether or not it is possible to send them to a reform school. If not, I recommend that authority be granted to exp el them from this school.

Please give this matter prompt attention and advise me as soon as possible as to what action the Office wishes me to take.
