Dear Sir,

I write you regarding Esther
Moose - a Tunkton Sioux Indian girl, in the
Carlisle - Penn. Indian School.

Her father died during her infancy; and
her mother was as bad as no mother at all.
Esther and her sister Sarah (since deceased)
were pupils in the Pipestone Indian School
when I took charge of it in 1894.
In 1901 I transferred her to the Hampton, Va.,
school, and she was returned to me at
Cherokee N. C. at the close of her term in
that school. I then transferred her to Car-
lisle, and she re-enrolled in that school in
1910 - being of age at that time.

sub I have been appointed County Demon-
strator of York County, Va., and my duties
will take me away from home a con-
siderable part of the time.

as this will leave Mrs. Harrio alone while I am away, it is necessary that we have some one to be with her. We much prefer Esther Moose, and I wrote to the Supt. of the Carlisle school, asking that Esther Moose be allowed to come here under the outing system: he states that Virginia is not in his outing territory.

Esther Moose is a girl of many good qualities, but she has not the mental force to contend successfully with conditions as they exist among her people, and she ought not to be returned to them.

She has all the time regarded her home with us and we have expected to care for her: but if she can not come to us under the outing system until her term of school has expired - we will have to arrange for some one else - which will very likely prevent us from taking her at the close of her school term.

In view of these facts, and keeping in mind the good of Esther Moose - now a woman of about 25 years of age, I respectfully ask that the Supt. of the Carlisle school be permitted to send Esther Moose to my home in Virginia under the outing system.

I make this request with no thought
of finding fault with the Supt. of the Carlisle
School.

I inclose herewith the letter of the Supt.
of the Carlisle School to me. and a couple of
letters of Esther Moose from which you can
readily determine her mental development.
An early reply will oblige.

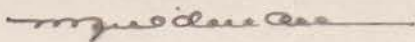
Dear Mr. Harris:
