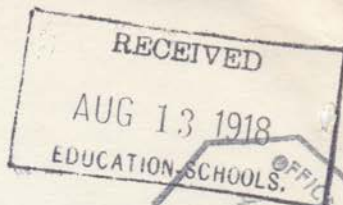

I also had a letter from him asking for Mike Walking Stick, a Cherokee boy from North Carolina, now living with a neighbor of his, and have asked him to take up this matter with Mr. Henderson, Superintendent of the Cherokee Indian School. I know of no boy now whom we could place with Mr. Headley.

Dear Sir, - The change in regulations at Carlisle, prompts me, through the suggestion of Mr. D. H. Dickey, our "Outing Agent", to write you in regard to possibility of having a boy supplied as assistant in my home.

Esche I have been a patron of the Carlisle school since 1900, and have had pupils continually since that time. Have always been interested in the Indians, and give them

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conscientious care and advice. We have excellent school facilities, which is located within 10 or 15 min. walk from home, to which they have access the full school term when desired.

There are only myself and mother in family. The requirements would be a boy strong enough to do light out of door, such as mowing grass and during the winter, bringing in coal and shoveling snow; also assisting in general household duties.

If there should be a boy in the district who wishes to remain out this winter and the patron does not need him, would a transfer be

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permitted should the boy consent?

Mr. J. E. Henderson, Supt. at Cherokee, N. C. was at one time outing agent for this district. If you do not favor the plan of transfers, could one be supplied from there?

I am employed in the above named bank, returning to my home every evening.

The boy I now have is 17 years of age, and believes he would like to see his people and start some line of work for the future; which I think is wise.

Hoping you may have some plan whereby a boy may be entrusted to my care, I remain,
