Request for return of Arthur Leib from Carlisle School.

Hiram Chase, Esq.,

Pender, Nebraska.

Sir :

With further reference to your letter of the 29th ultimo, submitting the request of Mr. and Mrs. George Leib of Pender, Nebraaks, for
the return of their son Arthur from the Carlisle School, you are advised that the Superintendent of the school informs me that the boy is
18 years old, as shown by the consent blank filed for his admission,
and that his application was endorsed by Superintendent Gommon of the
Omaha Agency.

The rules of the Office permit Indians who are in good health and over 18 years old to enter nonreservation schools on their own requests, regardless of the wishes of their parents, provided the Superintendent or Agent in charge of the reservation endorses their applications. This was done in the case of Arthur Leib, and as he is properly enrolled on his own application, he is obligated to remain at the school for three years. Therefore, unless the interests of the school do not warrant his retention to the end of that period he

cannot be withdrawn before its close. However, as it appears that he is already well advanced in his studies, he may be able to complete the course on which he has started before the three years expire, in which case he will be released earlier.

Sir :

Your letter of the 12th instant has been received, reporting on the enrolment of Arthur Leib, a newly entered pupil from Pender, Nebraska, whose parents request his return home.

As the boy appears to be 18 years old, the rules permit him to decide for himself whether he will attend an Indian school or not; and as he has just been enrolled, and the contract was with him and not with his parents, their consent not being necessary under the rules, he has obligated himself to remain at the school three years unless the interests of the school warrant his release before that period terminates.

As requested, the consent blank is herewith returned.
