Sir:

Referring to Office letter of October 5th, 1909, marked "Education - Administration, 70980-1909, 75064-1909, 76790-1909, A.V.S.", and relative to an inquiry that has been made concerning the health of Mary Silas, I beg leave to quote you the following report from School Physician Dr. Shoemaker, under date of the 13th instant:

"Mary Silas claims she injured her back in some way several years ago (possibly a sprain or wrench) and occassionally feels it yet, especially when she sits all day as would be necessary if she were in the sewing room.

She has never consulted me about this and has never had any treatment for it here. In fact, it does not seem to need treatment. Aside from this she appears to be in excellent health and has never received Hospital treatment. She has been here three years."

As the physician's examination has disclosed the fact that this girl is not ill and has never been ill while enroled at this School, I again recommend that the parents should be required to keep the contract they made when the girl was enroled at this school.

The Office has received your letter of October 31 and September 15, requesting that your daughter be returned home from the Carlisle School.

The consent blank signed by you and Mrs. Silas shows that Mary was enrolled for five years, consequentley her term has not yet expired.

Mr. Friedman says that she is doing very well in her studies and she does not wish to return home. However, as your last letter indicates that you think your daughter is not well the Superintendent will be requested to have her examined by the school physician, and if it is found that her health requires that she should be released from school you will not be required to keep your contract. If Mary's health will permit her to complete her course at Carlisle, it is hoped that you will be satisfied to allow her to do so. No doubt you will be gratified in the end.

to report that the daughter was enroled here on Aug.
17th of 1906 and that her term of enrolment has not
expired as is evidenced by the application for enrolment enclosed herewith.

Students are not detained at Carlisle when they have completed their term of enrolment except they file an application for re-enrolment.

This girl is doing well in school and does not desire to return to her home and for this reason I recommend that the father be required to keep his contract and that the girl should not be allowed to return
