Madam:

Your letter dated April 27, 1910, asking that your son Isaac Hill be returned from the Carlisle Indian School, was referred to the Superintendent. A report has been received from him saying that Isaac Hill ran away from his country home (in which he was placed under the Outing System) on June 16, 1909; that he was returned to the school on July 17, and on July 27, ran away from the school grounds; since the latter date no definite information has been received concerning his whereabouts.

The Superintendent transmits also considerable correspondence had with Mr. Charles M. Eames, at whose home Isaac Hill was placed. It appears that in 1909, when the boy first ran away, he took from his employer money and articles valued at \$25.50. The correspondence shows that the Superintendent has already informed you of these facts, and that on February 17, 1910, in response to repeated demands for settlement, he forwarded to Mr. Eames the \$10.00 received

from you. Nothing further has been heard from Isaac Hill although every effort has been made to locate him. You will be informed when the Superintendent at Carlisle has succeeded in finding him. The balance of \$15.50 owing to Mr. Eames has not been settled. The money to the credit of Isaac Hill at the school is not sufficient to cover the amount and may not be remitted without his authority. Your attention is invited to the Superintendent's letter dated November 17, 1909, in which he said:

As he (Isaac Hill) has only a few dollars in bank I would suggest that you remit \$15.50 more which together with the ten in hand will pay for his theft and possibly save him from jail or at least a term in the reformatory.

From these facts it will be seen that the Superintendent has done all in his power to locate and protect the runaway, and it is believed that his remittance of the \$10.00 to Mr. Eames has accomplished the last.

The boy is guilty of the theft charged against him, but as he is now a deserter from this school and the balance due him can be paid out only by his individual check, no settlement can be made until he is apprehended or except his mother will advance the difference required.
