
The Office will be very glad to have you express your wish as to this arrangement for your son, and therefore, requests an early reply to this letter.



Receipt is acknowledged of your telegram of September 7th in regard to the return of Cornelius Hartman from his outing home with George Gore at Newtown, Pennsylvania.

I have just wired you as follows:-

"Your telegram 7th. Will return Hartman to outing home tomorrow. Reason for recall from outing home is that boys do not get vocational training required by course of study."

During the summer we had about 170
boys and 110 girls on the outing. The boys
were on farms and the girls doing housework.
Last winter Mr. Gore had a boy who went home
in June and was replaced by Cornelius Hartman. This year, on account of the new
course of study, all the boys were called in
but about 40, 22 of whom are at the Ford factory
in Detroit.

It is apparent that if the boys are to have the benefit of the school and obtain a diploma under the course of study, they must come in during the school year.

Most of the outing patrons appreciated the reason for calling pupils in but in several cases, objections have been made as in the case of Mr. Gore.

I am quite sure that similar cases will arise and I will be glad to be advised if it is the wish of the Office that I should endeaver to meet similar requests by letting boys go out to farms from school during the fall and winter months.
