As there is no disciplinarian vacancy available at the present time nor none likely soon to occur at a salary approximating the one Mr. Schanandore is now receiving, the Office wishes to be advised immediately by wire if he desires to be considered for transfer to the position of farmer at a salary of \$1000 a year at the Mescalero Agency, New Mexico, in which event the Civil Service Commission will be promptly asked to give him a non-competitive examination to test his fitness therefor.

Mr. Schanandore has no status that would permit of his being transferred as farmer or industrial teacher unless he first qualified therefor through non-competitive examination.

Sir:

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of Office communication of the 9th instant replying to my letter of August 21st in which I recommended the transfer of Edwin Schanandore, disciplinarian at \$1000 per annum.

The Office says there are but few positions of this designation paying \$1000 or more, and that the transfer will have to be held in abeyance until a suitable opening occurs and closes with the following:

"For this reason, and with a view, in the interests of good administration, to the restoration of the former amicable relations existing between you, every effort should be made to dispel any wrong impression Mr. Schanandore may entertain as to your motives in proffering your assistance toward effecting his transfer, in order that his excellent record may not otherwise be marred to the detriment of his work by the harboring of a grievance apparently having no basis in fact."

I wish to say that Mr. Schanandore has been supported in his work and accorded the best of treatment; but he should not be allowed to withdraw his application for transfer for no other reason than that the Superintendent is willing for him to have it. The fact that he insisted on a transfer when I wished him to remain at the school and withdraws his request when he finds that I favor the transfer indicates plainly the disposition of

Mr. Schanandore and his attitude in the matter.

His usefulness at this school is at an end and I am forced to request that he be transferred at the earliest possible date.

He is as well qualified for the position of industrial teacher or farmer as disciplinarian and is a good band leader.

During my sixteen years as Superintendent, I have not found it necessary to recommend the transfer of a great many employees but do feel it absolutely necessary in this case.

Sir:

I have the honor to invite attention to the request of Edwin Schanandore, disciplinarian at \$1,000 per annum, for transfer forwarded to your office under date of January 24, 1913; the same reads as follows:

I have the honor to request a transfer from my present location to that of any other school that the Office might see fit to send me. I, of course, would prefer going to one of the larger schools if such arrangements could be made. I have been at this school (Albuquerque Indian School) now for many years and feel that I need a change. If my request cannot be complied with at this time would be glad to have it done when opportunity does occur.

In forwarding Mr. Schanandore's request I stated that he had suggested a number of times during the last four years asking for a transfer and had been advised that his work was satisfactory and the matter was dropped. On this occasion however I asked him if he had fully made up his mind and he assured me that he had and said that he had a right to have a transfer.

Under date of February 1, 1913 by Office letter "Education Employees, 11259-1913, G W B, he was instructed to prepare his request on the usual form which was done and forwarded to your Office under date of February 7, 1913.

It will be noticed in his request above quoted that he was willing to accept a transfer to any other school, that he gives as his reason that "I have been at this school (Albuquerque Indian School) now for many years and feel that I need a change." On his request forwarded February 7th in selecting places to which he would be willing to go, he says "Phoenix, Arizona; Sherman Institute, California; Chilocco, Oklahoma; or any other place where salary is not lower than what I get here". He gave the same reason as before for his request.

As stated by him Mr. Schanandore had been at this school for a great many years. During the time Mr. Custer was Superintendent here he accepted a transfer to Zuni, New Mexico. He returned to this school under transfer and entered on duty June 11, 1908 at a salary of \$800 per annum. On July 1, 1908 his salary was increased to \$900 and again increased on July 1, 1910 to \$1,000.

After forwarding his requests for transfer I did nothing regarding the matter until my clerk, Mr. Thackrey, showed me a letter received in reply to one he had written to Superintendent E. A. Allen which indicated that Mr. Allen would be pleased to have Mr. Schanandore go to his school and suggested that the exchange between the two disciplinarians might be arranged for by the two superintendents. I inclose herewith copies in part and originals of the remainder of the correspondence between Superintendent Allen and myself, omitting from copy of Mr. Allen's letter of July 16th the part

pertaining to his disciplinarian. These inclosures are marked "Exhibits A, B, C, D, E, and F.

On the 19th instant I showed Mr. Schanandore Mr. Allen's letter of July 31st stating that he would not be able to arrange for the transfer as he did not feel that he could afford to pay the salary Mr. Schanandore is receiving at this school. Mr. Schanandore seemed to become very angry when he learned that I had corresponded with Mr. Allen regarding the matter and said that it would seem that I desired to get rid of him. I called his attention to the fact that he had twice requested a transfer and made his request rather urgent, that his request was still pending in your Office and that I did desire employees who wished to leave this school to secure their transfers and that I did not desire to keep any employee at this school against his wish. I further stated to Mr. Schanandore that I had been endeavoring to secure for him exactly what he had requested. I did suggest that he might write the superintendents of the Phoenix and the Sherman schools regarding his desire to go to one of those schools.

On the 20th instant Mr. Schanandore brought to the office the inclosed letter requesting to withdraw his application for transfer for the reason, as he says, that I had intimated to him that he was not altogether satisfactory here and that I was satisfied that he would not be satisfied here if he stayed during the coming year. It will be noted that in both of Mr. Schanandore's requests for transfer he gives as a

reason for same that he has been at this school for many years and feels that he needs a change. I feel that Mr. Schanandore needs a change and I urgently request and recommend that he be immediately transferred.

At the time he made request for transfer he knew that I desired him to remain at the school. Now that he finds that I am willing for him to have the transfer he is bitterly opposed to accepting same and asks to withdraw his request.

Under all the circumstances, in view of Mr. Schanandore's attitude in the matter and on account of his disposition as shown in his letter inclosed, I feel that the transfer should be made at the earliest date possible and before the expiration of the present vacation period.

I feel confident that the Office is aware of the fact that Mr. Schanandore has received fair treatment at this school, and that it would be to the detriment of the service and of this school for him to be retained at this place longer.

In his letter of the 20th (inclosed as Exhibit (A)) he says "Since Mr. Perry is so anxious to force me out of this place I feel that I ought not to leave here under fire." Until Mr. Schanandore showed his disposition in this matter as his letter plainly indicates, there was no inclination to force him away from the school and he was not in any way under fire.

As the capacity of the school has been increased to 400 and I will have to be away most of the next two months to secure the enrôllment of pupils and as the year will be a busy one with improvements and the increased attendance, I feel that early action should be taken in this matter in order that I may have some one other than a disgruntled employee filling the important position of disciplinarian.

I presume we might as well make the exchange if satisfactory to you but Mr. Schanandore would not like to go to your school for less than \$1,000.00. If we decide to recommend the transfer and exchange, I shall ask that the salary at this place be reduced to \$840, same as you proposed paying Mr. Martinez.

Mr. Schanandore has the same working ability that he had when you knew him. He has had the Carlisle military training, but as he has been the bandmaster, he has been relieved of the duty of drilling the boys and handling the military matters. RULES GOVERNING TRANSFER.

A transfer is never a right inherent in an employee; it must be (1) a step taken for the good of the service, or (2) a favor conferred on a faithful employee.

From and after October 1, 1909, transfers will not be permitted employees during that season of the year when their duties are active, *except under the most imperative circumstances*. Thus, a teacher or matron will not be permitted to transfer during the school year, nor a farmer during the agricultural season. Officers in charge have been instructed not to forward applications of the former class prior to May 30, or applications of the latter class prior to November 30 of each year, except where they are convinced that reasons of exceptional weight exist why the request should be considered without delay.

Requests for transfer should be made only after very careful consideration, and with the full knowledge and understanding that such applications will be accepted at their face value, and the Indian Office will be in no way bound to consult the applicant further, but will make a strong effort to comply with the expressed wish of the employee, *at the same time taking steps to fill the vacancy created by the transfer*. The applicant, therefore, can not reserve the privilege of declining the transfer made in accordance with conditions expressed by him, and a failure to accept such transfer will leave out of the service the employee so failing to accept, with the presumption against his reinstatement.

Once the duty year has begun, employees should subordinate any feeling of dissatisfaction, bear with minor discomforts, submit to unimportant inconveniences, and forego the wish for assignment to duty elsewhere until the close of the duty year.

Applications for transfer will receive consideration only when made on this form, and forwarded through the proper officer in charge.
