Wheelock, recently resigned position at this school, I have the honor to state that Mr. Wheelock gave fairly good service while here. He did not give such service as he is capable of doing. He has an extravagant family. They live beyond their means. He came here owing a number of little debts. He left here owing several in town. He got to the point where he could not buy ordinary table supplies on 30 days time. This class of employees damage the reputation of the school and all of its reliable employes. His wife, his son and his daughter, in my opinion, will never fit into the Indian school life to the extent of making him a desirable employee. I do not deem it necessary to go into further details. Of course, I have no objections to his employment elsewhere in the Service.
