place the matter of my position in the Service before you in writing for immediate consideration:

I wish first to impress upon your mind that it is not a matter of dissatisfaction in the least degree of my work at Sherman that I wish to change -- to be frank I would rather remain at Sherman under Mr. Conser for the salary that I am receiving there than to go to some other school at a larger salary if I had only myself to consider. Without doubt Sherman at present is the best managed school in the service and the employes work in perfect harmony, no friction of any kind which makes it desirable and pleasant place to be, but I have a family to consider; I have a daughter who is now in the second year high school, a son in the fifth grade, both growing which means I must look for more money and convenient place for them to continue their school work. During the two years I was at Sherman the family got along as best they could, my salary was not enough to pay their expenses and mine too, the children had to give up their music lessons, the daughter had to give up art lessons in fact they just existed.

I would like to be transferred to Washington while I am not stenographer I can handle departmental work. At a salary of 900 plus what I can make in music outside of office hours I believe I can double my salary—I am experienced in church

choir work and have conducted Oratorios, this kind of work would give me quite an income besides orchestra and private lessons that I can develop. I really cannot see how I can remain in the service at the same salary that I am now receiving, unless I am transferred to Carlisle and there is no vacancy there and if there was Mr. Lipps would probably have some one of his choice. I have had considerable experience with various kinds of work so that my ability is not limited to the teaching of music. Mr. Conser will testify to this fact as I helped in various departments at Sherman--I had great deal to do with the Industrial departments and handled the new course of study.

If there is any place in the "Outing Department" I would accept that department so the salary justifies my being away from my family and can place them where the children can take up art and music and continue their school work. I will appreciate if y u will take this up very soon so that I can come to some decision and if I decide to resign from the service I can tell Mr. Conser before the end of this fiscal year.

Mr. Wheelock informs me that he would be glad to remain here if the salary were sufficient to enable him to bring his family here but that under the present conditions it is not practicable and he therefore desires to be transferred to the Carlisle School, which is near his home. His work since he has been here has been quite satisfactory and I would be pleased to retain him if conditions were such as to justify his doing so.

Loos from Chemawa be transferred to this position and that his wife be transferred to the position of assistant matron now vacant. I wish to suggest that during the coming year we have special need for a good band leader on account of the Panama-Pacific Exposition and the San Diego It is not improbable that our band will be ask-Exposition.

ed to play at one or both of the Expositions for a short time and I am especially desirous of having a band leader who will enable us to make such a showing as will be a credit to this institution and the Indians. We should have some person at the earliest possible date who we would have reasonable assurance would remain for at least the coming year. I have not had any communication with Mr. Loos but I have understood from persons who have talked with him that he has been very anxious to come to this school and as there is now an opportunity of making a transfer for both himself and wife I respectfully ask that this matter be given your favorable consideration if Mr. Wheelock is transferred to Carlisle. If the transfer of Mr. and Mrs. Loos is not possible I respectfully request that a good band leader be sent immediately on the transfer of Mr. Wheelock and the position of assistant matron, now vacant, be filled at once.

In early part of May I applied to the department for the position of Band Master at Carlisle Indian School. After the investigation the position was abolished I was then offered the position of Musical Director at Sherman Institute, Riverside, California and I accepted and reported about June 10th. Without doubt Sherman is one of the most beautiful school in the service and the gerneral work of the employes and the Superintendent Mr. Conser deserves the highest praise for efficiency and for results as shown in the students. I have seen other Indian schools but I have yet to see one where the discipline and general conduct of the student body is as good as can be found here.

If the position of Band Master at Carlisle is to be created again in connection with some other position I wish to place my name on your list of applicants for the position. I am not dissatisfied here nor do I want to be understood that I am after an easy job but I want Carlisle position because my wife's home is in Carlisle and my children have been attending the public school there, and then the expense of getting my family to Riverside would mean an outlay of not less than \$250.00, but the greatest of all reasons is the fact that I am graduate of Carlisle and I want to help re-establish it on solid basis. 

The Office is in receipt of your letter of May 13, saying that you will accept appointment to the position of disciplinarian at a salary of \$840 a year at the Navajo School, Arizona, if no other position is available at the present time.

With the exception of the Carlisle School, the position of disciplinarian at the Navajo School is the only one that has occurred during the past twelve months paying a salary in excess of \$720 a year.

Vacancies in positions of this character requiring the services of a man of your ability do not frequently occur.

As it would seem inexpedient, in justice to your children, to assign you to a position where they would be deprived of proper school facilities, no further action toward effecting your appointment to the Mavajo School will be taken. However, should a suitable vacancy occur elsewhere in the Service through the


