Yesterday I had a letter from Annie Coodlalook. She is still at Pt. Barrow and helps teaching schools. She said she is real happy and likes that place. The Eskimos seem to like her real well. This is first letter I got from northern Alaska since the navigation closed. I have not heard a single word from sister Mrs. Lehfeldt, who writes for her is a old lady and can't do too much. My sister has not been feeling well ever since my brother died last June. I have no more brothers living now. So sister is the only one I have. If I go to Alaska some day I think I will teach the little tots. I liked them when I was there the last time. I hope I can go soon I want to be at home with my sister, too. I would go any day if I had the chance. Alaska is so beautiful in the summer time. If they want a teacher for little children in Alaska I would respond for

one.
