My dear Dr. Himes:

On my way here from California I stopped off four days on Black Foot Reservation in Montana, during which they had an Indian Fair and I met more than two dozen of my old students of twenty years and more ago. I stopped off two days in Denver, six days in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, at the convention of Society of American Indians, a day in Chicago, another at Logansport, and arrived here most thoroughly with a fatigued and terribly bad cold, so I have had to spend several days in bed. At every place I had long auto rides and to be in constant talk with people, which was just a little more than I was able to stand.

I intended to-day to be in the Cumberland Valley at Mr. Kennedy's Jamboree, which I have attended annually so often and spend Sunday in Carlisle. My doctor here says that I have got to slow up and take strenuous measures to get rid of the cold. Under his direction I have spent two days in bed since coming here. I must go to Mohonk in a few days, visit in New York a day each, and two or three days with Mason in Baltimore. This consumes all my available time for my ticket requires that I shall be back in "Frisko by the 31st. My address is here ^{1350 Highland Ave} until the 17th, then Lake Mohonk, N.Y., for a few days, then Roland Park, Md.

I am exceedingly sorry not to be able to get to Carlisle, but it seems best not to add that tax as an addition to the somewhat strenuous travel, etc., but shall be glad to hear from you.
