My dear General:-

I recall with great pleasure a trip I made some years ago, from Washington to Carlisle, with a party of Government people to attend the Commencement at the Indian School. I remember that Senator and Mrs. Teller, Congressman English of New Jersey and I think Mr. Jones, then Indian Commissioner, were in the party, with others.

I was with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company at that time and on your personal request I was permitted to accompany
