Aug 27th 1811

Dear Captain Pratt.

Com' Wayt while
we very fairlyly getting
you detailed to go &
get the Indians. We
will not see you
this is splendid.
I take for granted he will
write you because you
have written him & he
will know where you

me. I telegraphed you
last night. I will write
by you, care of Comptayt
Washington. Today
telling you what Indians
espessially say which
is this.

(1) As we must
put up a large & rather
costly building for the
Indians we must know
just as soon as possible
of the Indians are
really coming. So when

you get out there please
telegraph me here at
Stockbridge.

"You can may expect
about (give the number)
~~boys~~ and about (no.)
girls." We are preparing
excellent girls quarters in
Va. Hall, which will be
soon done & will be
all ready for them when
they come. We want
fines for the young
men, & it is in their

accord that I will
let know so soon. So
please post me as soon
as you can, by telegram.

I have planned a fine
brick building for them
to cost furnished about
\$11000.00

(2) Be sure & get
a variety of styles of
first class photographs
of the youth you bring,
letting them appear in
the liveliest & most

Barbours Costume.

I'll pay the cost.

Have the negatives, then
we can order all we
like. If, however, you
can ~~get~~ ^{keep} up their end
of the bill you reach
Romford we ^{can} have the
pictures taken there

I don't think it best
to buy much clothing, ^{any}
at all before reading
the Almanac we have a
very slim almanac

for clothing & we can
make it up cheaper
than one can buy.

We shall have
600 yards of homespun
gray cadet cloth & then
made up at once for the
boys into suits or uniforms

The pictures will
be very effective &
keep as neatly.

When ~~the~~ my wife
shall be in a very
special crisis I will

meet you when you reach
Hampton with Indians

She is very low, but as
the best you can do & she
shall be as she is, I
would have her for a
few days. Please
