Dear Sir ^{and} School-Father.

It affords me a great pleasure
to write you these few lines.

I received your letter to my brother
Jacob and I haven't been able to locate
him up to the present time, and so I
thought I would write you in reference
to your proposed trip up in this section.

We are located about 32 Miles
from our nearest R.R. Station (Korbel, Cal.)
The Auto-Stage comes in twice a week from
Eureka, Arden via Korbel. It takes a day
to come in as the wagon road goes around
toward Trinity County and at a distance
of 60 miles, more or less. Most beautiful
scenery and I am sure a trip thru these
mountains will certainly be enjoyed by you
and Mr. Stewick.

The county is putting in a new

road between Hoopa and Korbak, and it will be completed by the middle of June. consequently, if you should decide to take this trip it would take you less than a day to reach Hoopa from Eureka.

We have numerous streams and creeks here, known for good fishing, but of course in places it is rather rough but a person can get to the best part of it on horse back.

We have a small Indian School here, situated right in the heart of the Valley. Mr. Jesse B. Mortsoff is our Agent and Supt. He served us as Superintendent here for several years once before and he was transferred to Carson, Nevada, he was so well liked by the Indians here, that the Department decided to have him take charge of our reservation again. I am sure he will assist you all in his power to study and locate the different tribes of Indians here. His district reaches the mouth of Klamath River or Regua. Cal.

By corresponding with him you will know when he is at Koopa, as he is away a great deal of his time on special business.

There are several returned students and few graduates here from dear old Carlisle but a great many boys and girls from various other schools, such as Chemawa Oregon Phoenix, Ariz. and Riverside Cal. We are all working for the same cause but cannot accomplish much, we are and have been so shut away from civilization.

I have been married for five years and have a little girl 4 years old. My husband has been acting as Forest guard for the last three years and he is well acquainted with all the nooks and corners of all the creeks where you can find good fishing, hence, he will be at your service should you decide to come up, as well as all the other returned students here from Carlisle.

My brother Jacob is married and lives
near Marshfield, Oregon. but I have
not heard from him

Hoping that you will be able to
make a trip up this way. I beg to remain
