8. What other positions have you held since leaving Carlisle?

I have worked
in Tailor shop at Quadarko
and once as Disciplinarian, at Methuen
School.

9. Tell me anything else of interest connected with your life:

I been in good health
since left school, and have raised wheat
Oats, Corn, Cotton, alfalfa, and now I feel
I can be a farmer, and not Tailor. Last winter
I passed by my old school, through to Harriburg,
to Washington, on business for my Apache
tribe. Dease Loneleaf, and I, gave to Washing-
ton, nearly every winter, on our tribal matters.
I am very sorry if you have ^{gone} blank before
but I don't remember, but I get this one
sure, and my Conduct you can get
from the Agency easy.
