I was very glad to return to the San Carlos Reservation to see my people, after an absence from them of twenty years.

It pleased me very much indeed to become acquainted with the costumes and manners of the white people in the east.

I would appreciate it very much if you would be able to obtain a position for me at Phoenix if possible. I choose this place because it is near to our vicinity. Being away for twenty years from my people I would like to be as close to them as possible. The heat will not bother me in the least as I have been in hotter places.

It also pleased me that you remembered me. My thoughts always wander back to Carlisle where I received my education wherever I go.

I have noted what you state in your letter of February the 12th, but I am surprised to know that you have gotten into trouble and that you are now confined to the Gila County Jail. In reply to your letter I can only advise you to make a good record while you are in Jail; then when you have served your sentence like a man the lesson you have learned should be of benefit to you in shaping your life so that you will not again get into trouble.

The records on file here indicate that you are now more than forty years of age, and for that reason it will not be advisable to give you another opportunity as a student at this school.

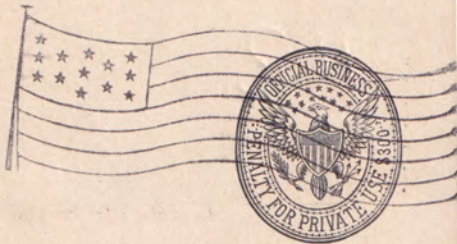
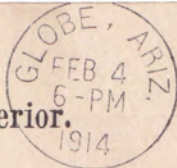
because I know that good people
