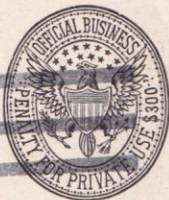
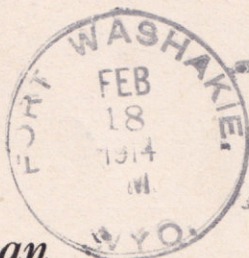

Robert Friday, an ex-student, writing from Topeka, Kans., says: "I never realized what advantages I had at the school until I went to struggle for myself. The knowledge I acquired has helped to make me independent. I am at present the foreman of the Royal Oak Farm, right in a civilized community. My wages are raised from time to time. Success to all those who have helped to uplift the Indian!"

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Robert Friday, a Northern Arapaho Indian from Shoshone Agency, Wyoming, who completed a term at Carlisle, and learned the baker's trade, is now employed as a baker with a large baking company at Cheyenne, Wyo. He receives \$18 a week.

Robert Friday who was in school here a few years ago spent a short time here on Thursday of last week noting the many improvements and shaking hands with old employees. He has been baker in the Wind River school, Wyoming, for some time, but is away on leave and will spend a few weeks with relatives at Geary, Oklahoma.
