Well I will tell you little about myself well I am getting along very well in
in colony also that I am well and happy at present

Well I will kindly fill out the blanks which you sent to me there will be
some that I cannot fill out

~~Some~~ ~~these~~ old carlisle students are getting along quite well here in the
this country and they own a very nice homes and some have good stock and
some have nice comfortable houses

I do not have any stock or a house to live in but I generally work from one
place to another I am here at colony just at present

The Seger Indian school is now close for this year the school children
are out in camp There are about sixteen boys and girls remain in school
and they will remain in school for two weeks and they will go to their homes
after the two weeks are up

I would like to know more about the carlisle indian school and whats is going
on up there this year so please tell me all about carlisle and its work.
Colony is getting on very nicely The Mission people are also getting along
nicely the indians are also doing well

All the indians were here in colony yesterday but now they all went back
to Washita where they have lands and homes

The colony indians are getting along nicely this year and they are improving
in their homes These indians do not stay in colony but once in each
month to see their children in school The school pupils are not allowed
to go to their homes but once a month

Let me hear from you by return mail and tell me all about Carlisle
Indian school Is Mr Herr still in that school The carpenter instructor
I used to take up the carpenters trade when I was at Carlisle school

Hopeing this letter will interest you very much

We been having some rains this month we hope to have a good crops this ye
ar How is the wearter ² up there

Be sure and write a nice letter to me just as soon as you can as I like h
to hear more about Carlisle school

This will be all for this time
