Referring further to your letter of Aug. 25th, in regard to William Adams who came to Cumberland about two months ago ill with Tuberculosis, you are advised that I have gotten into communication with Charles Adams, a brother of this young man, who states that he is not in a financial condition to bring the body home but would like to be kept fully advised from time to time as to his condition.

There is not at this time any fund on deposit at this agency that could be used to defray any expense whatever but such moneys as accrue from time to time will be used as much as possible in maintaining this young man.

My dear Miss Stallings:

I am in receipt of your letter of August 25, in regard to Willie Adams, who came to Cumberland about two months ago, ill with tuberculosis.

I have recently forwarded to the Superintendent of the Carlisle School a check for \$80 which I understand has been turned over to you for the use of this young man.

You are advised that this is lease money resulting from the lease of the Indians allotment and there will not be another payment for approximately six months. He has no other funds on deposit here.

I have recently addressed a letter to his brother and shall as soon as possible communicate to you any instructions which his brother may give concerning the disposition of the body should he die while in your institution.

My Dear Madam:

Willie Adams, who is referred to in your letter of the 11st instant, was formerly a student at this school. After an absence from Carlisle for a number of years he returned to the Borough more than a year ago and was employed in various capacities until the beginning of last July. Of an amount of \$125.00 he had at that time \$85.00 had to be expended by him to settle with a negro woman in Carlisle who had brought serious charges against him, and what was left must have been expended since for liquor.

Adams has property in Oklahoma and should soon receive another remittance. It is suggested, therefore, that you refer your inquiry to Mr. C. V. Stinchecum, Superintendent of the Kiowa Indian Agency at Anadarko, Oklahoma, with a view of having funds made available from which to pay your Association for treatment that has been and is being given him and for any other needs that may arise.

If Adams is not physically able to endorse the check with his signature his thumb mark signature may be affixed as per the instructions given on the back of the check, and it will then be negotiable for the full amount.

You will know best what use should be made of the money and I am sure that any action you take will meet with the approval of Superintendent Stinchecum of the Kiowa Agency. It is suggested, however, that an itemized statement be submitted to the Superintendent for the files at his office.
