

Max Favel, an Indian who is alleged to have deserted from the U. S. Industrial Training school at Carlisle, was arrested last evening by Patrolman Buttorf. Favel has been working for a number of weeks at one of the industrial plants, where he has passed himself oc as a negro. instructions for Favel's arrest were received yesterday by the police department from M. Freedman, superintendent of the school and an officer will arive in the city today to take Favel to Carlisle. Favel, who is twenty-three years old, declares that he cannot legally be kept in the industrial school and does not intend to remain there.

Max Favel, an Indian from the United States Industrial school at Carlisle, was arrested here as a deserter from the school yesterday and is held awaiting the arrival of an officer. Officer Buttorff arrested the Indian. He declares he will put up a fight before they keep him there. He apparently has a grievance against the institution. Favel was working in York about two months, and it is said he passed himself off as a negro. The police department some time ago notifled the Carlisle school people that such a person was here, and yesterday they received word to arrest and hold him.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.



Heferring to the Office's letter of March the 24th, I respectfully report that there is no evidence on file here to show that Maxime Fayel's transportation from his home to Carlisle was paid by the Government.

The records here indicate that Maxime was enrolled for but one year and that he went to his home after he had remained here for a weak or two longer than that year. Later he again returned to Carlisle, and within a few months after that he deserted to York, Pennsylvania, where he escaped detection by posing as a Megro. When he was apprehended and returned here to school he remained only from September the 20th of 1913 to October the 20th of the same year.

I transmit herewith other correspondence which seems to indicate that Maxime was not promised transportation to Carlisle.

Maxime Favel, of Waconda, Washington, has been in the Office and says that in the fall of 1911, when he was about twenty years of age, he advanced his transportation from Republic, Washington, to Carlisle, amounting to \$68.75. He understood at the time that he went to Carlisle that the transportation which he advanced would be refunded. He says that during his enrollment he asked that this be done, but no action was taken. He left the school in June, 1913.

Superintendent Johnson informs me that Favel returned here in the Summer or Fall of 1912, hanging around Spokane for a few weeks before going home. Then he appealed to Superintendent Johnson for more funds to return to Carlisle,

which were given.

I never promised him that he would be reimbursed for his expenses on the first trip, merely informing him that the Carlisle Superintendent might consider a claim, as above stated.

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
