INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

I must stated that I had some time to get home from Grant Pass to Requa, we had all kinds of weather on the route rain and snow.

The road from Crescent city to Requa was ~~blockage~~ for about a week.

So I did not get home till Monday 12-14 so I was on the road from ^{and Requa} Grant Pass to Crescent city for three weeks.

Having noted in your favor of September the 8th that you claim to be less than 26 years of age I had a further search made through our records to determine how the mistake occurred. It has been learned that when you were enrolled in 1908 your age was entered on your record card as 20, and you will readily see how that would make you 26 years of age now. However, the application that was filed in 1908 indicates that you were born in June of 1890, which makes you just a little over 24 years of age.

It is to be regretted that the mistake was made, but you would yet have to pay for your transportation to Carlisle and special permission for your enrolment would have to be secured.

Dear Mr. Wadsworth:

This will acknowledge receipt of your circular communication of the 14th instant reporting the dismissal from the Salem School of William Hedge and John Fritz.

Both young men were formerly students at Carlisle. Hedge found it difficult to get started and for the first several years of his stay here was exceedingly hard to manage. He improved greatly during the last two years of his period of enrolment and when he went to his home he was considered one of the exemplary young men. When he applied last fall for reenrolment he had to be refused permission to return because he was then 26 years of age.

Fritz remained at Carlisle less than three years and during that time he deserted at least four different times. When he was net away from school as a deserter he was continually in trouble. Finally it was reported here that he had reached his home.

2- Mr. H. E. Wadsworth, Superintendent.

I am bringing the information on the foregoing sheet to your attention to show how necessary it was to adopt a general plan of cooperation as that embodied in the instructions that have recently been issued by the Office. You and your assistants could have been spared a great deal of trouble if the information I have given you could have been considered at the same time Hodge and Fritz submitted applications for their enrolment.

I will also take this opportunity to assure you that at any time a former student of Carlisle applies for enrolment at Chemawa I will consider it a favor if you will request me to submit information relative to the applicant. Students formerly enrolled at Chemawa and applying for enrolment here will not be received until I have been assured by you that they are entirely worthy. It is only by such cooperation that undesirables can be kept away from the non-reservation schools and the going from one school to another by those desiring "trips" or to engage in athletics or some similar apparent attraction can be prevented. Definite information should also enable a Superintendent to advise an incoming student how best to get started to carry on the work already undertaken in the schools formerly attended.



Under authority from the Indian Office I have expelled from this school for flagrant violation of rules and immorality, William Hodge, a one-half blood Klamath Indian boy 24 years old of Requa, California, and John Fritz, a three-fourths blood Klamath Indian boy, 22 years old, of Warren Creek, California.

They are therefore not eligible for enrollment in a non-reservation school without specific authority from the Indian Office.
