SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

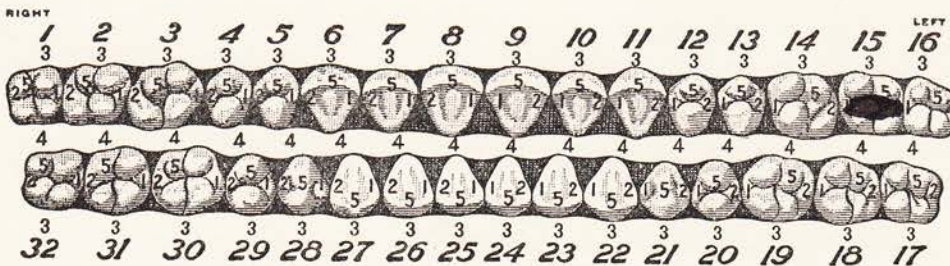

Several telegrams came here the latter part of last week reporting the serious illness of Irwin Sherman's mother. Finally, when money was sent by telegraph with which to pay for his transportation home I gave him permission to go without the usual formality of asking you for approval and recommendation. His conduct here has not been entirely satisfactory this last year and so I was not reluctant to see him go.

Transportation for his passage to Wagner, So. Dak., is being procured for him at his own request, and after he has arrived at your Agency I would thank you to notify me.

If Irwin desires to return to Carlisle next September I shall not object to his doing so if he makes up his mind to do better work than he has done. He will have to understand, however, that he would only be on trial and that he could only remain as long as he behaved himself.

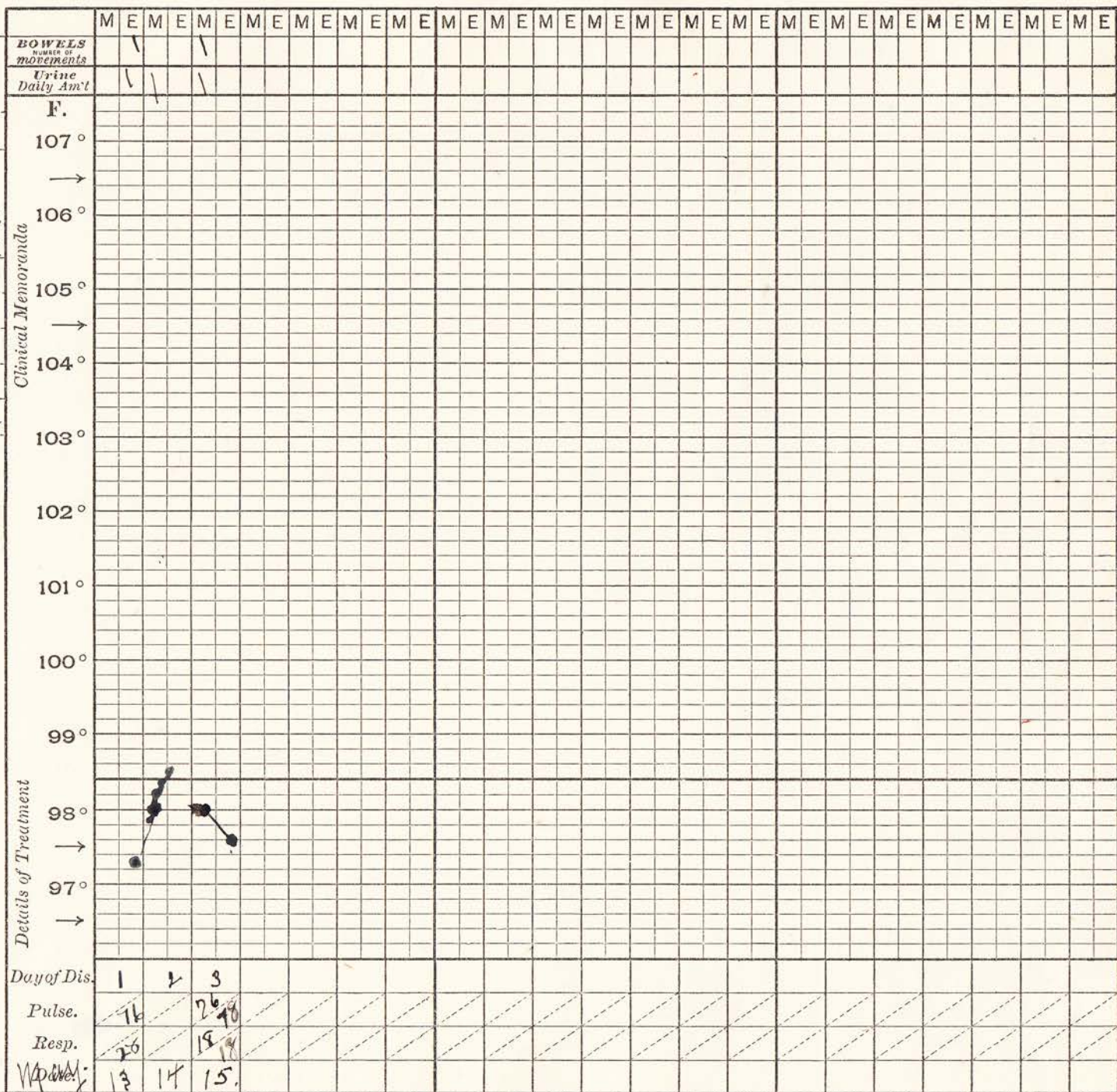

My dear Madam:

I regret very much to advise you that it became necessary on January the 26th to send Irwin Sherman away from Carlisle. In spite of the fact that he was taken back last fall only after he had assured me he would make better use of his time it became necessary to keep after him every hour of every day to make sure that he was in school or at his work. He was not accomplishing anything and was a demoralizing influence, and so his removal from school was the only course of action left.

At his request transportation for his passage to Sioux City was provided for his use, and an amount of \$27.63 has now been charged to the account of this school to pay for the same. It seems to me that Irwin should be compelled to pay the amount and I am writing you for your co-operation. An amount of \$3.00 in cash was advanced him to pay for incidental expenses, which should also be re/turned to me.

I hope you can let me hear soon when I may expect to receive the amount of \$30.63 that had to be expended to get

Irwin away from Carlisle so that the agent of the C. V. Railroad Company who furnished the ticket can be requested to hold the charge open.

For your information I am having copied below paragraphs of letters that were written last fall in connection with Irwin's request that he be allowed to return here to continue with his studies:

"Regarding your own return to school I can only state that you will have to make up your mind to do better work than you did last year before you can be received again as a student. I think it wise to inform you at some length regarding Irwin Sherman's conduct and the reasons for his being dropped from our rolls. This boy was continually absent from work and school the excuse always being bowel trouble. I had him confined for a week to the hospital for observation. The Dr. reported that while there might be slight tendency to diarrhoea there was no reason why he should not attend school - I arranged with his teachers for his excusal at all times from the class rooms & with his trade instructor also. In spite of this he persisted in his absences and he was ordered home. I might add that upon searching his trunk I found a sweater belonging to another boy which Sherman claimed as his. But upon facing the boy & sweater he admitted he had taken it.
