Dear Friend:-

I have your letter of January 19th, and note that there are a number of children, including your own, whose transfer to Carlisle is desirable. I am sending you a half dozen application blanks, which you should have filled out carefully and transmit to me through the Superintendent of the Cherokee School.

I feel very confident that we can give to these young people a thorough education and a training in some trade.

I regret that there is nothing here to which you could be appointed as a Government employee. I would suggest that you write to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C., and ask for appointment to the position of Indian Assistant or some other position in the Indian Service and for the blanks which are necessary for you to fill out. The Indian Office will probably ask me for an endorsement of your record while at Carlisle which I shall then be glad to give.

If the young people whom you mention are entirely eligible and can be passed on by the agent and the physician I would advise losing no time in returning the application blanks so that transportation can be placed.


