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

girl. I understand that her parents are dead, so before arrangements are made to send her to her home I
would thank you to advise me what can be done to insure
proper protection and care if she is sent home. Your
prompt consideration of this request will be appreciated.

In brief Lucinda's story is about as follows: It seems that when she was at her Outing home at Cynwyd last summer it was the custom for her to go across the street from her home each Sunday afternoon to the home where another of our girls, Margaret Brown, was staying and that then both girls went on to Bala to visit with Jane Owl during the afternoon. About the last Sunday in July, it is claimed by Lucinda, Margaret Brown had already left her home when she (Lucinda) got there and that then she

started off by herself to for her usual visit with Jane.

On the way she seems to have met a young man who greeted her. After she had answered his greeting he engaged her in conversation with the result that she accompanied him for a walk and spent the afternoon with him.

Lucinda claims that she had never seen the young man before and that she has not seen him since, and that he refused to tell her his name when she asked him to do so.

Mrs. A. H. Holcombe of Cynwyd, with whom Incinds spent the summer, has been asked to make an explanation and it is hoped additional information can then be gotten which may result in identifying the young man who is evidently responsible for the girl's downfall.

is well outfitted. Later a package too will be sent to you

We have expended a great deal of money this year in weeding out undesirable pupils, and unless we can fill the school with students who desire to profit by the opportunities here offered, it is a waste of time, energy and money. Indian race would be accomplished with only a few hundred desirable students, than to undertake to crowd the school with a lot of undesirables.

Generally speaking, however, I believe the students we receive from your reservation are very desirable and in spite of all precautions I realize that occasionally we will get be who is not desirable. Just now we are taking in no students at Carlisle who are not especially recommended, and we have been turning away a great many who have school advantages near their home, or who for other reasons are not deemed desirable to enroll at Carlisle.
