Dear Mr. Brown:-

I have your letter saying that you want to send your son to Carlisle with Caroline when she returns this fall. I shall be glad to enrol your son here but it will be necessary for you to take up this matter directly with Mr. Hinton and the Indian Office and to get the approval of Mr. Carter for the boy's release from Wahpeton before I can enrol him. You will likely have to pay the boy's fare to Carlisle too, because of the exception in his case.

Your reason for wanting to make this change for your son, that is so you may have your children at school together, is good and justifiable.

I am glad to know your daughter is pleased with the work given here and I hope that with your aid she may be able to induce other nice girls to return with her.

I would suggest that you take up the matter of enrolling your son, promptly so there may be no delay in your children beginning school early in September.

Dear friend:-

I have your letter relative to the enrolment of your three children at this school.

If you can obtain from Mr. Carter of Wahpeton, the release of your two sons, I will be glad to arrange for them to come to Carlisle. I would suggest that you communicate with him concerning this and let me know the outcome.

I note that you wish your 17 year old son to take the course in automobiling. I do not advise any young man younger than 21 years to take this course. When they are sent to the Ford Factory, they cannot become profit sharers, which means an equivalent of \$5 a day wages, until they are 21. The young men, 21 years and over, whom we are sending to the Ford now become profit sharers after six months. If your son were sent up with older men, you see how unfair it would be for him to work three or four years for a privilege which the others obtained in six months.

I am sorry that I cannot pay the transportation of your younger daughter until she is 14. If you want to send her and will pay her fare, I will be glad to enrol her.

Dear Mr Francis:

I have a boy who is very anxious to enter the automobile factory to learn the trade. He soon be 17 years old. I have taken matter with Mr John B Mc Gillis, Oversee Indian employment, he kindly advised me to request for his admission to Carlisle School for a special preparation to enter into one of the factories. He has finished the 7th Grade. I am very anxious for him to learn a trade while he is young. I have another boy who is now of age and finished the course prescribed by the Commission of Indian Affairs to one of the Non-Reservation School. and he ^{has} not finished any trade. Consequently he is handicapped and shiftless, I desire this boy to begin learn trade early before he is too old.

He is now enrolled at Wahpeton Indian School. I have endeavored last year to have him transferred to Carlisle School where his sister's Coe lived was. Mr Lippo was willing he should come to Carlisle. but Carter of Wahpeton School would consent. He says, unless the boy desires some trade which does not taught in Wahpeton School, he would be willing to let the boy be transferred to Carlisle.
