We are at present one of the heaviest tax payers in Mahnomen county' and our interest in county affairs lead us to make the suggestions we are making.

I shall be very glad to have you do this and am mailing to you under separate cover application blanks, some school catalogs and copies of the last number of the Arrow. You can use these in your soliciting.

The Department's rules about taking pupils from one non-reservation school to another are very stringent and you must exercise great care in selecting only those pupils who have finished the course at the non-reservation school they have been attending. The age limit is from 14 to 21 years. We can get special authority to enrol those over 21 years of age but they must pay their own transportation. We accept no pupils below the 4th grade.
