I would be pleased to have you give me more information concerning this man, and if there is anything you
can do to stop his permicious activity, I shall appreciate it.

The local newspapers and wherever he is should be made to
understand that he has no connection whatever withhibis institution.

Owing to the increased cost of all supplies for the school and particularly of all materials going into the make-up of a newspaper or magazine, it has been deemed advisable to continue The Arrow as heretofore but to combine the issue, on the first week of the month, with The Red Man under the caption, The Carlisle Arrow and Red Man.

The material usually found in The Arrow will be in the combined issue, together with such other leading articles and information as may be collected of interest to Indians, Indian Service employees, and other friends and well-wishers of the Indian race.

The regular subscription price will be One Dollar a year payable in advance, but to all ex-students of the school a special rate of Fifty Cents a year is made. This is within the reach of every one.

As a further evidence of its interest in you, you are offered the privilege of becoming a paid subscriber, at the reduced rate, to the paper and magazine that will come to you each week during the school year bearing welcome news of your beloved school.

It will be our endeavor to make the new magazine issue newsy, interesting, and instructive, and we hope the change will be to your liking.
