Dear Sir:

Replying to your letter of January the 7th, this is to state that I had explained fully to Mr. Guyon in my letter of December the 18th why I have no grounds upon which to base a recommendation to the Department at Washington in connection with a request for authority to return any portion of the funds that have been taken up in my official accounts.

Only a few days ago a similar case where loss even greater than that reported in Atlanta was mentioned had to be dismissed because it would have been manifestly useless to attempt a justification of the outlay necessary to cover the rebate desired.

Carlisle had an "off" year in football this last season and little, if any, more than expenses has been made. Final settlement of all accounts will probably show a small loss.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of Dec. 18, 1914, to Mr. C. M. Guyon (Wahoo), has been turned over to me for reply.

It is not necessary to refer to the subject matter of this correspondence further than to say that it is an effort to have returned to him a part of the guarantee put up for the football game between Carlisle and Auburn in Atlanta, last December. The amount of the guarantee, which was paid to you, was \$3,000.00. The loss that was sustained by Mr. Wahoo, on account of this game, amounted to \$2,897.75.

I note that you say that the athletic funds are now deposited and accounted for just the same as other funds coming into your hands and I note also that you say that it would require authority from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs to pay out any of these funds.

We would like to have you give your written endorsement of the proposition of returning a part of these funds. We suggest a sum not less than one-half of the amount of the loss sustained. We would like to have you in this connection, give your reasons for this recommendation, as you gather from all information you have in hand on this matter. We will then undertake to have the same passed upon by the proper authorities and if necessary, will undertake to have a resolution passed in Congress to this effect.

As you observe, our idea is that the first thing to start is a clear and unequivocal approval of the proposition by the authorities at Carlisle. We would like to have this as the beginning of our effort, to have this money returned.

Our schedule of games is a very hard one, but our practice began with a rush and the development of the team seems to be progressing satisfactorily.

Referring further to your letter and the mention of your brother Joe, I have not ceased to be sorry that he could not see his opportunity at Carlisle. If he had returned to school last year to complete his period of enrollment here he would surely have been one of the young men who were selected to take the students' course in the Ford Motor Company's establishment at Detroit, Michigan. The six who were selected to begin the work on January the 1st of

this year became "profit sharers" during the summer months and received their five dollars for every day they were at work. Such an excellent opportunity comes but once in a great while to young men who have not spent more time in preparation for work than have boys from this school and as Joe had made so excellent a record here he could now be an independent worker as a result of his training and experience in the Ford Company's shops.

My dear Charlie:

Your letter of Dec. 11th has been received and in reply I have to advise that the Athletic Committee on athletics at the Carlisle Indian School is arranging a schedule for next season but it is not the intention to undertake to support an expensive football organization, as Secretary Lane has given us to understand that foot ball must be made subordinate to educational needs of the school. The total receipts expected from the games that would be scheduled next season would probably not amount to the salaries formerly paid to the coaches. Carlisle has not made any money on foot ball since 1913, not has it won a single important game since that year.

Our best foot ball material leaves us about the time they are able to do much and it is getting much more difficult to hold them since fellows like Gilman can get out and within two years be established in business that pays him more than \$4,000.00 a year. Our aim is not to allow athletics in any way to interfere with the chief aim

of the school which is to equip young men to get out into the world and earn a living. Ou

Our physical director will have charge of the foot ball and all other athletic teams at the school and Mr. Warner has recommended a man for assistant to Mr. Clevitt during the foot ball season, and in all probability the Athletic Committee will be inclined to follow Mr. Warner's recommendation.
