But had to dispose of my stock when I left I was left to take charge of two younger Brothers after I left Carlisle. And I put them to District school and kept them four years when they were big and old enough to do for themselves. I have held positions of trust with

Big mining Companies since I left home. I travelled quite a good deal having lived about a year in New Mexico then 18 months in Arizona. I have been employed here nearly one year for the Bakersfield Iron Works

I have no good photo of myself but will send you a post card photo. I have regained my health in the South West and there for intend to stay here. I have about one thousand dollars in money out. I have transacted my own business since I left Carlisle. And was only sixteen years of age.

 appreciate it to hear from them.
