I have your letter of November 11, asking for our record of Edward Norton who was a pupil of this school for several years and was dismissed only a short time ago. In reply I would say that Edward Norton is one quarter blood Hoopa Indian, aged 9 years. He entered this school in May, 1900, and was dismissed August 31, 1904. His record while at this school is very far from satisfactory. He was notorious for telling falsehoods and for petty thefts and we seemed unable to find any punishment ^{or other treatment} that helped him in the slightest degree. He was very slow in school room work, and all in all a very undesirable pupil. He ran away in August and went to his sister-in-law, who is living at Yuma. As she requested to keep him with her, we were glad to drop him from our enrollment. I would be glad to see something done for the boy, but his prospects are very discouraging. ~~The~~ A reform school would probably do him more good than any other.
