Dear friend:-

I have your letter asking me to help you get into the Students Course at the Ford Factory and have to advise that it will not be possible for me to do this. We have made it a rule that those young men who want to join our Ford Class, should first come to Carlisle and take the preparatory work here. We have a class selected now for the June party. The next class will not likely go up until December 1917.

Sometime ago we made an effort to get into the Students' Course, one of our ex-students who had an excellent record but were refused by the authorities there. We therefore decided not to recommend any except those who came to Carlisle and joined one of the regular classes. We carry these on our outing list and a certain portion of their earnings are sent to the school each pay day.

You must remember that the first chance is given to our own regular students and that other applicants must take their turn. Perhaps knowing this you could change your plans and not return to the school until next fall.

Dear friend:

I have your letter asking me to help you to get into the Ford Motor Works. Yours is only one of many letters which have come to Mr. Lipps within the last year from old students asking him to help them get into the Ford factory. His answer has always been that if they are willing to come back to Carlisle and enter one of our regular Ford classes, which prepares the boys to enter the students course, he will be glad to help them. If the young men have families or are in other ways unable to do this, he cannot help them. I would suggest that you write to Mr. Charles Dagenett, Supervisor of Indian Employment, Washington, D.C., to help you get into some of the other factories in Detroit. If you wish to come back to Carlisle and prepare with one of our regular classes, I will be glad to do what I can to help you. We have our June class about ready now and are expecting to send another class in December 1917.

Dear Sir,

I arrived home on Thursday from Detroit where I had been for two weeks. I wanted to get into the Ford Motor works, but was unable to do so at the time.

I went to see Dr. Marques to see if I could get in and he told me that the only way I could do so was through a recommendation from the Sup't from Baltimore. I was badly disappointed that I could not get in right away. I have never had the chance to work

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where there was any chance of advancement. My brother Peter and I wanted to go into the business together and make something of ourselves and thus your recommendation I will realize my ambition.

I had an accident at Akron, Ohio and that is why I could not play longer in Detroit as I didn't have money enough to keep me there longer.

If I get into the factory I intend to go through Mich. State Auto School. I could go to school in evening.

I have appealed to no one for help before, but now I do and with your help I will do nicely. Please don't refuse me, because I want to get in at once and take up the work.

To get into the Ford Motor works will mean a great deal to me. It will also mean a better life and better companions. You do not understand the conditions on the reservation. There is no chance here to make a decent living and I want to get out. I surely have the ability to do things if the chance is given me. I will surely appreciate your kindness in helping me into the factory.

I have talked it over with the boys at Detroit and we are forming an Athletic Club composed of ex-students of Carlisle.

They say they'll expect me soon.

As soon as I hear from you saying that you will get me in at the Ford Motor works I will start for Detroit at once, and please don't disappoint me.

The life here on the reservation is a misery to me, and when I get into Detroit it will mean happiness for me and for one whom I intend to have for a better half.

I hope to hear from you at your earliest convenience
