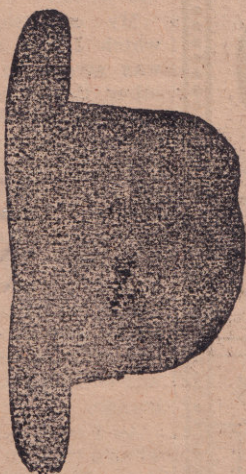

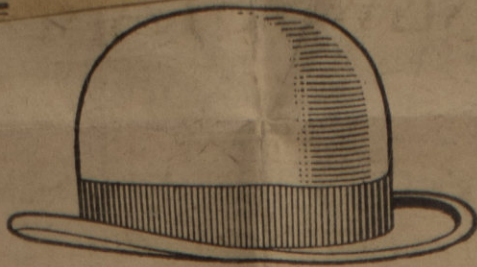

Farmer Ford Fakes.

The Farmer editor faked the Oklahoman's report of the big well on the Rector lease, 5-18-7, trying to make appear that Yale had become contiguous to the Cushing field. The writer of this protest also indited the Oklahoman report by changing a few words in the Oklahomans's write-up, the Yale editor removes the Milliken well three miles from Cushing to a that much nearer approach to Yale. This is a small matter within itself, but as we find it equally unreliable, stolen and garbled. In truth Cushing at her present stage of development could absorb Yale and never notice the taking on of anything more or less than a little suburban addition.

Stokes Starts Something.

The case of the Stokes construction Co. vs. the city of Cushing, heard in chambers at Guthrie Tuesday, was postponed until the 14th of November for the reason that the plaintiffs' attorney was not present, he being in Oklahoma City, before the Supreme Court in another action.

This is the case wherein the Stokes Construction Co., seeks to compel the city to accept and pay for the city sewer work.

Mayor Droege, City Attorney Higgins, former town Clerk Geo. A. Dungan, Col. O. R. Lilley and other interested parties were in Guthrie during the day.

Great Gobs of Gas.

It is stated that the Creek County Gas company controls a 300,000,000 feet supply of gas with about thirty wells in the field not yet connected up. During the past year it has been supplying three oil refineries and other manufacturing plants and is now laying a six-inch pipe line to Bigheart, with the design of delivering about 50,000,000 feet of gas daily to various Kansas companies. This is strictly a Cushing proposition originating and having headquarters here.

FAMOUS ECHOES.

There are many places where remarkable echoes occur. On the banks of the Rhine at Lurley, if the weather be favorable, the report of a rifle or the sound of a trumpet will be repeated at different periods and with various degrees of strength from crag to crag on opposite sides of the river alternately. A similar effect is heard near a loch in Scotland. There is a place in Gloucestershire, England, which is said to echo a sound fifty times. Near Glasgow there is a spot where, if a person plays a bar of music upon a bugle the notes will be repeated by an echo, but a third lower. Three echoes will be heard in all, each lower than the preceding one. The whispering galleries of St. Paul's, of the Cathedral church of Gloucester, and the observatory of Paris owe their curious effect to the same reflection of sound.
