Now, you know I came home about six years ago, in 1994. I think about what you used to tell Col. Platt what to tell them about us when he got hom. He used to say, "Stick to it". So I try to do what he says. I try to help my people. But they don't believe what I tell them about it. So I take care of myself and I try to be a man. I am farming now. I like farming pretty well. I am doing well in Oklahoma. I have made everything I have. I raise lots of hogs. I have sold them all now. I am going to do it a great deal better. I am going to fix fence and everything. I like to raise hogs but I don't like to handle cows. I used to get mad milking the cows in New Jersey. I used to mikk twenty head in one houre by myself. I though I would never have them.

But I am glad I learned to work in Pa. and N. J. because the difference in the work in Pa. and N. J. helps me. I am trying to be good.

I am a Christian man. I don't smoke, drink, whiskey, or play cards or use bad language. I tell the young fols about the best way. We had a good meeting Saturday on my place, telling them about God and Jesus. I am glad I wnet to Carlisle and learned lots of things.

Please send me the Carlisle papers. After I get your papers I will send the money to pay for them.
