INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Dear Mr. Friedman:

The following is the result of an investigation which I madeon Jan.3,1913 regarding Amelia Hewitt living with Mrs. Elizabeth Smith at Jenkintown, Pa.

Amelia was transferred to Mrs. Smith Oct.2,1911. On Jan.2,1913, Amelia Hewitt gave birth to a baby boy. The nurse said the baby was two weeks overtime. Amelia told the Dr. and Mrs. Smith before I arrived that the father of the child is George Kraft of Jenkintown.

Mrs. Smith has been one of the most trusted patrons for fifteen years an dis considered the standard by many other patrons.Mrs. Smith had not the slightest suspicion of Amelia's mutil condition, the Dr. was called on Thursday morning.

Mrs. Smith said in her conversation with me ,"You know Miss Gaither asked me to take Amelia and I took her "under a cloud". I tout t thought I could help her." Mrs. Smith said Amelia had never been of co' out of the house in the evening except to attend praver meeting and church and as the church is only a few steps, not half a square, she allowed her to attend praver meeting on Wednesday nights and church Sunday: evenings. Mrs. Smith had asked the

> Sunday School teacher to chaperone Amelia home as Mrs. Cooper's home is just a few doors on the other side of Mrs. Smith's. Mrs. Cooper is the wife of the minister and Amelia's Sunday School teacher. This, Mrs. Cooper did when Amelia was there. Mrs. Smith frequently telephoned to Mrs. Cooper to inquire if Amelia were at the services an din every case but one she was there at the church. Mrs. Smith asked Amelia where she had been as Mrs. Cooper had said she was not in church. Amelia replied " 0, yes I was there but Mrs. Cooper is old and c cannot see well.' She didn't see me."

Mrs. Smith resalized that Amelia needed very close watching but Amelia eluded Mrs. Smith's vigilance in the followingway as Amelia related it to me on Jan.3,1913. I attach her signed statement witnessed by the nurse and myself. She met this man when he delivered groceries at the door. This was not often as the grocer is not Mrs. Smith's regular grocer. On a Thursday evening about the middle of March1912, Amelia had permission to attend an entertainment in the church which is, as stated before, a few con doors below Mrs. Smith's home. She did not attend the entertainment but met George Kraft and spent the time with him in the yard of Beechwood Inn, a place in Jenkintown.She had intercourse with him at that time and often afterwards on Wednesday and Sunday nights in other places when Mrs. Smith thought

> she was in c hurch. She told me she had never menstruated since that Thursday night at Beechwood Inn.

She was always home about the time the church services 1111 41 10 were over. One evening it seemed rather late and Amelia was not wet at home so ime. Smith walked down to meet her. The church services were not over and Amelia came to the door and said. "I thought you would be worried about me." She seemed to allay enter s every supplicion. Her sanitary napkins were hung on the line ...

When I visited Mrs. Smith's home on Nov.12th, I inquired about Amelia's monthly periods and Mrs. Smith replied that they were all right.

This George Kraft is a young white single man, about twenty years old. He is employed by Riggins , the grocer, as delivery man. This is in Jenkintown, Pa.. As far as I could learn he does not have any reputation at all in Jenkintown. Amelia told me she had told Kraft of her condition in August but that he did not believe her.

Chief Thomas, chief of police in Jenkintown, advised me to swear out a warrant on information for Kraft's arrest before the Justice of the Peace in Jenkintown. This I did last even-Jan. 3, 1913. ing, Kraft will be held until Amelia can appear against him which may be a little less than two weeks.

Your letter of the 14th inst. received. I note that you say there are four items on the bill that Mrs. Smith presents that you do not have. It will be well if you tell Mrs. Smith about it.

Mrs. Smith is very angry, that you deceived her as you did and of course she has no pity for you. She claims you disgraced her name and her household and no amount of money will repay her for the shame that she feels, all on your account. You not only disgraced Mrs. Smith, but you also made a bad name for the Carlisle School and for your wace. I am very much out of Fatience with you myself and if I had not been compelled to handle mour affairs I would have nothing to do with you either. You and your husband have no right to expect any one else to pay your bills. For months before you and Kroft were married you lived together as wan and wife, and in doing so he brings upon himself the responsibility of taking care of you and your child. You need not look to anyons else to pay your balls. If it becomes necessary you will have to take in washing or work by the day.

You do not have the right idea of Mrs. Smith's duty toward you. You must not expect decent people to care for you or say good-by to you, or have any feeling for you when you act as you have acted for the past ten months. If you would stop and think, I am sure that you could sde that you do not deserve pity from anyone, let alone Mrs. Smith. The thing for you to do now, it to get to work and pay that bill.

Dear Mr. Friedman: -

According to your request, I have visited both Amelia Hewett and George Kraft for the purpose of obtaining information relative to the advisability, and possibility, of their being married; and my communication to you is a report of the conditions as I have found them.

I first went to the home where Amelia is living with her new born child to assertain if she is willing to marry Kraft; and she told me it was her wish to marry him, providing he is willing, but that the does not wish to marry him against his will. I then began to investigate the character and reputation of the young man in question, to see if it would be advisable to grant the permission for the marriage; and I found conditions about as follows:

George Kraft is a young man about thirty years of age, strong, industrious and kind in disposition; but somewhat wayward in his habits. His ability is not to be banked upon, as he left school very early in life and was allowed to grow up with the street waifs and loafing class of the town. We has been employed by the same man for about twelve years as driver for a groeery wagon, which speaks well for him as far as muscular work is concerned. At the present time he commands a salary of Forty dollars per month, and is

living with his parents, 511 willow St., Jenkintown, Pa.

George is of low berth, yet he is kind and seems to be honorable in many respects. He expressed to me his willingness to marry Amelia?, saying, it is only right that he stand by the girl whom he got into trouble. I rind he is kind to his parents and has given them a part of his earnings ever since he was able to do for himself, and that he is not destitute of shame; being much disturbed at the thouhgt of his parents finding out about his trouble.

While George partakes of the vices quite freely, yet he sticks to his work to his work and has never been arrested for any cryme, except in one occasion for gambling. The town officer, Walter Wood, tells me he has known George Kraft from ghildheod and has no knowledge of his doing anything out of the way more than other young men of the town who have had the same training. To use Mr. Wood's own words, he said in part: "George will go out for a good time, He'll drink, smoke cigaretts and partake of the vices quite freely, as most young men do now days; but he is a boy who could borrow a dollar if he wished to do so, for everyone knows that he will pay it back.2"

In brief, both parties are willing to marry, and while Amelia's future does not look as bright as it might; yet under the present conditions I think it advisable and best that they be permitted to do so.
