SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Cards should be certified to be person in whose presence thumb prints are affixed. Erase "Disbursing Officer" and insert title.

Be sure to date cards.

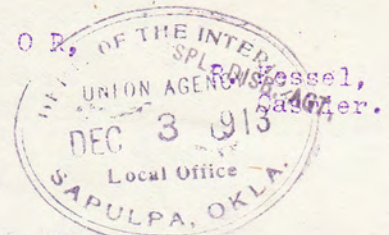


Dear Sir:

I have to inform you that your ward, Albert Lee, was returned to this school the latter part of last week in a drunken condition and that he will be kept under punishment until I hear from you how I shall co-operate with you to send him to some other institution or to you or his father.

He cannot be kept longer at Carlisle, because I have learned that he has consumed a great deal of whiskey during all the time he has been enrolled here and that there are good and sufficient reasons to believe that he has brought intoxicants to other Creek boys enrolled here.

In this connection I will also state that this is not a reform institution by any means and that a certain degree of liberty has to be allowed our boys. Those that do not understand how to use their liberty and their privileges can-

I have received your letter of March the 13th, in which you request that the balance of the amount yet to the credit of Albert Lee at this school be used to provide transportation for his return here. For your information I will state that of the amount of \$75.00 that was placed on deposit for transportation there is yet an amount of \$41.67 available.

In this connection I must also call attention to the fact that Albert was not entirely as desirable and worthy a student as we should have at Carlisle, so before I place transportation to your order for his use I should like to have a detailed report showing how Albert has conducted himself during the time he has been at his home. Unless it can be shown that he has really continued to do as well as he had started to do for several months before he went home and he has made up his mind to come with the determination of making the best possible use of his time it will

Referring to your letter of December the 8th, this is to report that Albert Lee will be given permission to return to his home at any time you recommend that such action be taken. Albert gave us a great deal of trouble last summer, but during this school year he has made a very good record. When he was seen at this office this morning he gave me to understand that he desires to be at home for the Christmas holidays and if you can wire me your decision in the matter it will be a favor to Albert. He has an amount of \$128.00 to his credit in our school bank.

Referring further to your letter I have to report that when Alex Simmer was seen at this office yesterday he left me under the impression that the reason for his apparent dissatisfaction is his lack of money with which to satisfy his personal wants in so far as the purchase of extra articles of clothing is concerned. Enclosed is copy of a letter, self-explanatory, which I today received from Sallie Sams, Sapulpa, Oklahoma, relative to her brother Albert Lee, who it appears is attending your school. I would thank you to advise me as to the manner in which this case should be handled.

Teacher's certificate which was omitted from my letter of November 23, covering school attendance of Sealey Alexander, is enclosed.

I am also in receipt of a letter under date of December 1, 1914, from Alex Simmer, a student of yours, who it appears is not very well satisfied, and asks that this office make his guardian send him \$100.00 with which to purchase clothing and trunk preparatory to coming home. Letter has gone out to Alex asking him to see you and talk matters over and that we feel sure if you can help him in any way you will do so. Kindly see this boy and if he really needs clothing an effort will be made to provide for this item through his guardian.

I have your letter of March 16th, 1915, asking for detailed report of the deportment of Albert Lee since his return from the Indian School at Carlisle, Pa., stating that unless it can be shown that he has really continued to do as well as he had started to do for several months before he went home, and he has made up his mind to come with the determination of making the best possible use of his time, it will be a waste of money and time and energy to make arrangements for his return, etc., I beg to advise you I have seen very little of Albert Lee since his return to Sapulpa, and have not especially observed him, as he stated to me on his return home that he had only come for a short vacation and would soon return to school; I presumed the school would keep in touch with him. My request for return transportation was made at the request of Albert. Please advise him, care of this office, of whatever action you propose in this matter.

On checking over the pupils' bank accounts at this school, I find that Albert Lee, a former pupil from your reservation, has a balance of \$31.01 and I am enclosing a check for that amount which please deliver to Albert.

In looking through the files, I find that on October 20, 1915, you wrote requesting us to send the balance in Albert's account and October 25, 1915, a check for \$41.67 was sent with the statement that it was the entire balance. This was an error. The \$41.67 was the balance left to pay his transportation back to Carlisle, while the \$31.01 is the balance in his bank account. please explain this to Albert.
