

My dear Mr. Wise:

It is noted in your favor of the 29th ultimo that Daniel Needham will probably not be willing to return to Carlisle to complete his period of enrolment here, but in view of the fact that his case is now covered by specific regulations it is believed that he should not be given permission to remain at Haskell Institute. Daniel must have known that he could not be enrolled because of his prior re-enrolment at Carlisle, and it is my opinion that a beginning must be made somewhere to let students know that they are under certain obligations when they enroll at one or the other of the nonreservation schools.

I trust that barring Daniel from enrolment at Haskell will not result in his discontinuing his school work, and although he will not return here you may assure him that we will do what we can to assist him if he desires to go to work at his home or elsewhere.


After receiving your letter of December 22, 1915, I called Daniel Needham to my office and talked with him concerning his return to Carlisle. His statement is that he returned to Carlisle for an additional year's work, paying his own expenses both ways, and that the unexpired portion of a school year was all that he was under any obligation to serve. Of course I know nothing of the facts. I agree with you that the new regulation or amendment 119(a) applies to this boy's case. However, he does not seem to be at all willing to return to Carlisle. He is anxious to take our business course, he says, although it is doubtful whether he can carry the first year work successfully, entering at this time of the year particularly. Our business department is quite crowded this year and I am not at all solicitous of increasing the enrollment.

It does not seem to me that Daniel will very willingly return to Carlisle, however, and if you care to make a recommendation to the Office, in view of all the facts as you know them, and the Office approves, I will

extend him the opportunity of trying the business course here. He has not been taken up on our records and will not be without the proper recommendation from you and authority from the Office.

If it is your desire, I shall willingly cooperate with you in an endeavor to get him back to your school to complete his unexpired term or his course there. Possibly, for the sake of discipline, it may be well to advise him to return to his home. You know his record so much better than I do that I shall not attempt to advise. I have no feeling in the matter one way or the other, as he came in without any formalities whatever, and he has no claim on this school for any special consideration.

My dear Daniel:

I have noted with care the statements contained in your letter of the 11th instant and must call your attention to the fact that you err when you state you did not return to Carlisle in 1914 for any definite period of enrolment. There is on file here the application which was approved and submitted by Superintendent Dickens, signed by yourself, for re-enrolment for a three year period. We also have on file a letter you addressed to me on October 2nd of 1914 in which the following appears:

"As I am anxious to return to school again, I thought I would let you know. I have already signed the application blanks and as soon as my trans. arrives I will start out. I am anxious to return and continue my studies and I hope my transportation will not be delayed in any way."

Our records contain the additional information that the cost of your ticket was paid from Government funds and that you were allowed to go to your home "on leave".

I appreciate fully the position in which you are placed, but that does not alter the situation in any way. The fact remains that you are enrolled at Carlisle and that you should not have gone to the Haskell Institute without consulting Superintendent Dickens and requesting that your permanent release from this school be effected. Your application for enrolment here shows that you are now twenty-two years of age and that fact alone should have been sufficient reason for your finding out whether the authorities at the Haskell Institute desired to secure the special authority from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs required to effect your enrolment.

You had an excellent record at Carlisle and I do not want to deprive you of continuing with your education, but I must insist that you comply with the Regulations that now govern just such cases as yours.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.
