I further say that the said child was born at Weidman on Feb. 1896; that the father, Peter Otto, So. a full Indian of the Ottawa tribe Tribe located at Weidman Agency; that he left the tribe about 1890; that the mother, died, a full Indian of the Ottawa Tribe located at Weidman Agency, and left the tribe about 1890; that the said child was born and reared in the United States, and now actually resides therein; and that he has attended the following schools:

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without special permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Foster M. Otto, an ex-student of Carlisle, is now living at Charlevoix, Michigan, where he is making good at his trade of tailoring. In a short time he expects to enter a large establishment, where he hopes to perfect his trade.

Foster Otto, a member of the Freshman Class, left last Monday for Sante Fe, New Mexico, where he is to take charge of the tailor shop at the Indian school there. His friends wish him success.

A letter was recently received from Foster Otto stating that he is getting along nicely with the tailor trade and that he likes the country at Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Foster Otto, an Ottawa Indian from Pinconning, Mich., who completed a term at this school and learned the tailor's trade, is now employed in St. Catherine's School for Indians at Santa Fe, N. M., in the capacity of instructor in tailoring. He is making a success in his present field.

Sir:

I have been informed thro a very reliable person in the Indian Service. You have in your school offered to young Indians who are reliable, ambitious and who are willing to make a name for themselves and also to their race. A course of automobile construction, covering six months period, also given preference has to where they desire to work whether in Detroit or Toledo.

I hold a certificate issued from Carlisle spring 1909, for proficiency in tailoring

during my experience as a tailor I have made money when it was to be made and very glad to get a chance to make my expenses five months of the year.

As you shall notice from looking over letters from the Supt of Haskell Institute, I applied admission to his school but turned down on account of my age, which is 30 years. I had one object for trying to get in and this is, to take the commercial course offered there. By specializing on such I thought I would increase my usefulness and financial earnings also.

One thought that has been foremost in my mind since the refusal was to work and save enough money to take me thro the Sweeney Auto School of Kansas City, Mo; the tuition is fifty dollars for six week instruction

Thro this letter I ask if it is possible for me to be enroll in your special course of automobile construction. If so I shall be ever so thankful and do all in my power to promote the good works the school has done for the Indian race as a whole. Understand, I do not ask for admission just to get out of making my living for a period of six months, but, is in real earnest with desire to make myself a useful man in the community I live in. To be able to own a garage and be independent of any one. If what I have said in this counts for nought I have done my best to tell you how bad I like to be enrolled in your automobile course.

Then I shall take another way to get some better kind of work I like better then the present

trade I am trying to make my living.

I have no money to pay my fare to Carlisle at the present as it took all what little I had to come here from the southwest.
