With the little education I received while at Carlisle, has enabled me to compat with my white neighbors and do my own and earn my own living. I was sent to Old Carlisle while quite young. being only nine years old and staying there until almost the five years. I learnt but very little as young children are all well care but mighty little in learning. I went to Carlisle in the Fall of August 20th 1882 and came home in May 1887 with my father - That's as near the dates as I can give. I could not commence to try and thank my teachers that had all their trials with me while at school - We had our school class at that time in the Old Chapel. 1882.
