Dear Friend

I received the letter which you wrote to me some time ago. I was very glad and please to hear from you people. But I haven't had no time to answer it soon, because I am working hard every day.

I suppose you would like to know how I spend my days now. I am the black-smith and silver-smith. I had the shop one side of my house, also several other works, but those two I do the work most. But I haven't got all the black-smith tools that I need, but I do the work well.

I repair wagons and make rings, bracelets, ear-rings things like that. Some one will be round every day that wants his things to be mended or make.

I am married, I have two sons

one of them is but round fifteen years of age, the other but crime.

The oldest one is at Saint Catherine's Indian School in Santa Fe, the other one go here at the Sisters school.

I guess I will never get to sell Carlisle any more because I am so poor I haven't got no money to go. I am so glad that I know some of the black-smiths work. This help me a great deal in my living and is good business to know black-smith. Because there will be work all the time no matter when.

I thank you ever so much for the papers you are sending me. I do not know how to read very well, but I understand little. Good bye, with best regards to all your people, from all of us, I am,
