John Corn, the Carlisle Indian school runner who defeated Tewanina in a ten-mile race at Washington recently, and who took third place in the ten-mile at the Seventy-first regiment meet Saturday night, is a lucky Indian, and owes his very life to his athletic training. If he was equipped with anything but a runner's pair of lungs he would have been with his scalp-raising ancestors by this time.

After the Pastime games at the garden a couple of months ago Glen Warner, the Carlisle athletic and football coach, steered his braves to a hotel and chased them to bed. Corn, never having had any previous experience with gas, mistook it for a candle, with the usual results. He blew it out when he was ready to tumble into the hay and went to sleep. The morning following they found him half suffocated, and it took a couple of hours to bring him around again.
