

Dear Mr. Lipps:

I have your letter dated February 26th, relative the whereabouts of James H. Miller, a Pueblo Indian, formerly enrolled in the Carlisle Indian School.

In reply I have to say that James Miller for some time made his home at the Zuni Pueblo but this was not his home excepting by adoption. He, I think, is a native of the Pueblo of Acoma, New Mexico. A year ago last fall some of his people came to visit James and when they went back he went with them. I expect he may be found in the vicinity of Acoma. A letter addressed in care of Mr. P. T. Lonergan, Superintendent of the Albuquerque Pueblos no doubt will reach him. His occupation for several years has been herding sheep for Mexicans outside of any reservation.


Dear Sir:
